



BTEC Level 3 National Extended Certificate in Music Performance. Summer Independent Learning - Year 11-12

Task 1 – Performance

- Polish up a piece you are already working on and video it. You could then share it with your friends and family. You can even send it to me at michelle.colvill@nclt.ac.uk if you want. You might find a recorded accompaniment on YouTube for pieces that are very regularly played for grades etc.
- Resurrect an older piece that you really enjoyed. You will be able to play it better now you are a bit more advanced. Listen to some performances of the piece on Apple Music/Spotify/YouTube. What do you like about these performances? Is there anything you can incorporate. Again, video or record your performance.
- Choose one new piece to learn from scratch. You could use Rock School or Trinity College or other similar exam pieces. Look at the lists of pieces for your instrument from these syllabuses to help you choose. It doesn't have to be from these exam boards, it can be a piece that you have always wanted to learn. Again video or record it as evidence
- The important thing to remember is that it is better to play an easier piece well, than a more difficult piece poorly. Make sure you perform it musically, paying attention to dynamics, tempo markings and phrasing. You must perform at least one of these pieces in front of your teacher (teacher's choice) during the first two weeks of college. You can use a backing track if you wish.

Task 2 - Music Theory

When we start the new BTEC course, we will be studying the compulsory the “Practical Music Theory and Harmony” unit. We will go over keys, triads, dissonance etc. but require you to have some basic knowledge. On the following (external) page you should be familiar with the topics in the following sections:

- Scales and Key Signatures– all sections
- The first two lessons from Chords, and Diatonic Chords sections

 - How you would copyright your work? Include: the role of music licensing organisations, PRS for Music.
 - Synchronisation fees
 - Sampling - what are samples and how can they be legally used in your work?
 - Piracy and illegal downloading
