PHOTOGRAPHY A LEVEL YEAR 13 SUMMER INDEPENDENT LEARNING TASK

The summer holidays are a very important time for the development of your Component 1 coursework project. The time off college is a great opportunity to further your own work and make really good progress on your Year 13 work. Your teacher will give you more information about these tasks. The work you should have completed when you return to college in September is the following:

PART 1 (COMPULSORY)

A: SKETCHBOOK/SLIDES WORK:

Most of this work will have been produced before the summer holidays but make sure pages are up to date and all work is annotated with explanation and reflection.

- 1. Title page (Your name, Component 1, 'Identity')
- 2. Mind map/s <u>all</u> possible starting points for the project
- 3. Mood board a page of gathered images to use as visual inspiration
- 4. Artist research and image analysis piece/s 1
- 5. Contact sheet photoshoot 1 reflect on the shoot. Annotate with key words, etc.
- 6. Enlargements/edits/experiments for shoot 1. Remember to go BIG with some of your favourite images and don't forget to annotate your work (not every image necessarily).

B: PHOTOSHOOT 2 (Min. 30 images):

Develop your idea by taking your next series of photographs. These should be as high quality as possible. Make use of the long days and nice summer light. These photographs need to link directly to your initial idea for the Identity project and not be something unrelated. You can take more than one photoshoot over the holidays if you wish. You might like to view this guidance from BBC bitesize on considering portrait images – created for during lockdown but still lots of relevant advice.

PART 2 - OPTIONAL BUT STRONGLY RECOMMENDED (EXTENDED LEARNING)

Look through the attached list called 'What to watch' and our suggestions for some optional gallery visits. We have collated many different documentaries, websites and interviews. Select and watch a minimum of **three different sources** which apply to your own area of interest for the Identity project. Broadening your research will really help to develop your knowledge of photography as a subject. You may also be able to use this research when it comes to writing the Personal Study and collating an essay research folder. Make sure to do the following:

- Note down the name and source of the video
- Make some notes as you are watching jot down any interesting points, facts, or things that you would like to research further.
- Document this information in your sketchbook/slides project with some stills/cover image and your own thoughts and notes.

DEADLINE FOR ALL WORK: THE FIRST WEEK BACK IN SEPTEMBER.

Bring in your **sketchbook**, **research** and any **photographs** taken over the summer to your first lesson. You will have time to edit your new shoot during the first week/s back.
