Part 2: Tort Law

In order to prepare for assessments in September below is two scenarios and an essay to complete. **Complete these in FULL please (30 mins per question).**

Scenario 1 on Tort Law:

Ice hockey is a fast-paced and physical contact sport. Ivan and Jack are both semi-professional players for Freetown Falcons. They have written agreements and get paid for each match they play although the club does not deduct tax or national insurance. The club also pays for their medical insurance but they do not get paid sick pay or holiday pay. Their contracts require them to turn up to training and matches and to abide by the rules of the game and the club by maintaining the highest standards of conduct.

On Saturday, Ivan and Jack are playing against Anytown Hawks. Leo and Tom are players for Anytown Hawks and they have both been tackling Ivan in a very aggressive manner. Ivan is about to score a goal and Leo tackles him illegally. A fight breaks out and the referee blows her whistle to stop the game. During the fight Ivan strikes Leo with his hockey stick and breaks his arm. A week after the match, Jack is in a nightclub when he sees Tom having a drink. He follows Tom outside where he punches him and breaks his jaw saying 'this is for last Saturday, you loser'.

Advise Freetown Falcons whether they will be vicariously liable for the torts committed by both Ivan and Jack (20)

Scenario 2 on Tort Law:

Louise decided to take her daughter Aubree (15 months) to the Yorkshire Wildlife Park. Louise buys a season pass at the entrance for her and Aubree and they start their journey round the park. As she is pushing the pram around she trips up over a tree root that is sticking up near the footpath. She hurts her ankle. Aubree needs changing so she takes her to the ladies toilets. When finished Louise washes her hands but is scolded when the tap is far too hot. When she goes to complain at reception she is told that the toilets have recently been refurbished by a national company 'ToiletsRUs' as they were outdated. The worker tells Louise that it only reopened this morning and she is the first person to have used it.

Advise whether Louise will be able to claim under Occupiers Liability (20)
